Exam Format: There will be a single mid-term exam given during the semester (**February 28th**). The final exam (**May 6th @ 8AM**) is *not* cumulative *unless* you should miss the mid-term examination (see the “Missed Exam” section below). Each exam will cover material presented in class, as well as readings and assignments scheduled outside of class. The exam format will be provided in the class prior to a given exam. You should bring your UNC ID, and a basic calculator with you to each exam.

Missed Exam: There is no make-up midterm examination. You are forewarned well in advance to properly schedule your time and make proper arrangements for other potential conflicts. Regardless of the reason, if you miss the midterm exam, then you will take a *cumulative* final exam that will count toward 50% of your grade. If you should be unable to attend the final exam, then you will need to provide me with an “Exam Excuse” from the Dean’s Office. The make-up for the final exam will be held at my convenience. Note: a cumulative final exam will cover the *content from the entire course*.

Current Event Presentation and Discussion Board Posts: In each class, we’ll devote the first 10 minutes or so of class time to the discussion of a relevant issue. The discussion will be led by a team of two students (team assignments will be posted on Blackboard on Wednesday, January 19th). The team leading the discussion may want to prepare a brief set of “talking points” (five bullet points max) to guide and focus the discussion. To provide a sense of how this might work, I’ll do the first two presentations on January 10th and January 14th.

After your presentation – and before the start of the next class – I would like you to start a Blackboard discussion thread on your issue. The thread should give a brief background of the issue and list the “talking points.” Feel free to attach a link to a website or an article that may provide more background information on the issue. It will be your responsibility to monitor this thread (e.g. stop the discussion when it becomes redundant and keep the discussion on-topic). One-half of your grade for this exercise (i.e. 5% of your total grade) will be based on your selection of a narrow, well-defined topic, your presentation of the topic, your selection of talking points, your monitoring of the discussion board, and your ability to meet the stated deadlines. Since this is a current event exercise, your issue should be no more than 2 years old. Furthermore, it should be significantly different than any topics that have already been covered.

The other one-half of this grade – 5% of your total grade – will be based on your contribution to other discussion threads. In all, you will be required to make 5 posts on 5 different threads. Please only make 5 posts! If you make more than 5 posts, then I will only grade the first five. An acceptable post will: 1) be clearly written *in your own words* and have minimal grammatical errors; and 2) be written in the voice of an economist! This implies that your answers will not contain “smack-talk” or be subjectively based. Your response will be based on solid economic reasoning and draw on what you have learned in this class or your other economic classes.

Quizzes: The textbook provides the basic structure and foundation for the course. We will be working through the different chapters of the text as we progress through the course. Students are expected to keep up with the reading and will be quizzed on the chapter readings *prior* to class discussion. These quizzes will be announced in advance and your lowest quiz grade will be dropped. There are no make-up quizzes.

Problem Sets: Six problem sets will be distributed during the semester. These assignments will be given to you at least 5 to 7 days before their due date. My expectations and requirements will be explicitly stated in each assignment. These assignments must be turned in by their deadline or a 15 percentage-point penalty will be assessed for each day they are late.
