<u>Course Overview</u>: This course will outline various macroeconomic models for the purpose of analyzing past and current states of the economy. Additionally different economic policies will be evaluated for effectiveness in each of these models, mainly in response to exogenous shocks to the economy.

The course will begin by explaining different sources of macroeconomic data and their usefulness. Then the Classical and Keynesian models are compared and contrasted in depth, with special focus on the main assumptions under each model. The second half of the course will cover popular macroeconomic models after Keynes, open economy macroeconomics, and economic policy.

<u>Attendance</u>: Given the size of the class, attendance will be taken daily and attending lectures regularly is crucial to understanding the material covered in the course. Also, a student's class participation grade is determined by contributions to in-class discussions.

<u>Honor Code</u>: The University's honor code will be adhered to strictly. Students may work with other students on homework assignments, but need to turn in each assignment individually.
