# **Course Description**

As an introductory course, ECON 101 covers both microeconomics and macroeconomics with basic theory and models that can be used to analyze real-world situations. The course will first introduce some parts of microeconomics: (i) Supply and demand; (ii) Price and quantity controls; (iii) Elasticity and taxation. Then we will move to the introductions of macroeconomics: (iv) GDP and CPI; (v) Economic growth and fluctuation; (vi) Unemployment and inflation; (vii) Stabilization policies. Finally, we will cover the basic market structure: (viii) Perfect competition; (ix) Monopoly. If you wish to major in Economics, this course will be the gateway and you must have at least a C as the final grade.

# Teaching Goals and Learning Objectives

The purpose of this course is to give you a basic understanding of core principles. I will provide clear and detailed examples of the abstract definitions to help students better understand the material. In the meantime, we will learn to use diagrams and basic mathematical tools to analyze problems. By the end of the course, you should be able to:

1. Understand and apply the definitions of economics comfortably, e.g., opportunity cost, tradeoffs, etc.

- 2. Analyze issues with economic thinking like an economist, e.g., in terms of marginal costs and benefits, incentives, etc.
- 3. Apply economic models to analyze real-world situations, e.g., to predict and evaluate the effects of government policies.

## **Required Materials**

- **Textbook**: In this course, we will use *Essentials of Economics (6th Edition by Paul Krugman and Robin Wells) and* 5th Edition is also acceptable. This textbook is sufficient for this class, but you may also refer to other textbooks if you want. You can use either an e-book or a paper book. You can find and buy it on Amazon, MacMillan Learning, or any other websites you prefer. You are welcome to use an older version of the textbook, but it is your responsibility to make sure that you are completing the proper readings and assignments.
- Sakai: The course website will be <a href="https://sakai.unc.edu">https://sakai.unc.edu</a>, and you can access by entering your ONYEN and password. After logging in, you will find a site at the top called <a href="https://example.edu.nce.edu.n
- **Gradescope**: All your homework assignments should be submitted on Gradescope, which can be founded on the left column on your Sakai page. You will be responsible for making sure that your submitted assignments are **complete**, **clear and easy to read**: when you take photos or scan documents and submit, please check the pages, which should be (i) properly oriented, (ii) ordered, and (iii) numbered. If you want to amend your submissions, you can freely re-submit before deadlines. Although Gradescope will send you an email if you submit successfully, you are strongly encouraged to check your submission manually as well. **Late submissions are not accepted** (please also refer to the policies below). ### **Course Contents**

- Lectures: We will introduce and discuss important concepts of economics and see some related examples. Slides for each day's class will be posted on Sakai prior to the class so that you can print, annotate and/or take notes during the lecture. Here are some notes for you to be successful in this course:
  - You are strongly encouraged to attend every lecture and recitation. Given our intensive schedule, it would be very difficult to catch up if you are absent several times
  - o It usually takes time to digest new materials, thus, you should spend time **previewing** (e.g., read textbook and/or slides) before class and **reviewing** (e.g., check your notes) after class.
  - o If you have any questions regarding concepts or assignments, please do not ignore them and you are encouraged to attend office hours or recitations to get clarification.
- Recitations: For each recitation, you will work with your cohorts to solve some questions together. I will first give you about 45 minutes to work on the questions. Then, I will be ready to discuss the answer keys at the end of each recitation. According to the University Calendar, we will not have recitations on May 29 and June 19.
- In-class Participation (Poll Everywhere): During class, you will do some practice questions to help you better understand the material. Make sure that you have registered the Poll Everywhere account and have access to the Poll Everywhere mobile app or the website Pollev.com during class. You can expect one poll per class, and you will receive 2 points for a correctly answered poll, 1 point for an incorrectly answered poll, and 0 points for an unanswered poll. I will drop 3 lowest polls.
- **Problem Sets:** You will have three sets of questions to complete which are designed to help you better understand the materials we cover during the semester. These exercises should be done and submitted **individually** (**group work is not allowed** and will be considered as cheating) via Gradescope before the corresponding due dates. Points will be taken if your submission: (i) is not clear or readable (ii) does not assign corresponding pages to each question (iii) is not complete.
- **Midterm Exam #1:** The first midterm will be held on Tuesday May 30<sup>th</sup>, and will be administered in-class during our designated class time (9:45AM 11:15AM). Midterm #1 will cover what we learned before the first midterm. More information on the midterm structure will be provided closer to May 30<sup>th</sup>.
- **Midterm Exam #2**: The second midterm will take place on Tuesday, June 13<sup>th</sup>, and will be administered in-class during our designated class time (9:45AM 11:15AM). Midterm #2 will cover what we learned between the first midterm and the second midterm. More information on the midterm structure will be provided closer to June 13<sup>th</sup>.

• Final Exam: A 3-hour final exam will take place during the final exam period assigned by the registrar (8:00AM – 11:00AM Thursday, June 22nd). It will be **cumulative**, i.e., all material from the first lecture to the last lecture. More information on the final structure will be provided closer to June 22<sup>nd</sup>.


## **Course Grades**
