Course Description: Econometrics is the application of statistical methods and economic theory to the problem of identifying, estimating, and testing economic models. This course covers concepts and methods used in empirical economic research. Students will learn how to conduct and how to critique empirical studies in economics.

Prerequisites: ECON 400 and 410; a grade of C or better in ECON 400 and 410 is required.

Textbooks: There is one required textbook for this course: *Introductory Econometrics: A Modern Approach* by J.M. Wooldridge, 6th/7th Edition.

Learning Objectives: In this course, students are going to

- study and learn the concepts of simple vs. multiple linear regressions, endogeneity, instrumental variables, hypothesis testing, etc.
- interpret regression outputs, analyze relationships between different variables, identify causal relationships from simple associations, provide an economic analysis using real-world data sets, etc.
- learn how to use STATA to do statistical and econometric analysis.
