Assignments (60%): There will be 3 graded assignments. You can discuss the assignments with your peers, but you are expected to submit your own version of the syllabus.

- Assignment #1 (20%) – Syllabus
- Assignment #2 (20%) – Develop two Active learning exercises.
- Assignment #3 (20%) – Class visitation report
