That time is full of activity for Dr. Tim Chartier who talks the math of bracket-making on TV, radio and in newspapers and magazines. Learn the math he’s discussed on CBS Evening News, The New York Times, and USA Today. Learn how to make your own predictions via your math decisions. Jump into some sports analytics and learn how mathematics can help tame the madness.

This event will occur on March 4th at 5PM in Hamilton Hall 100. This event is organized by the Sports Analytics Intelligence Lab (SAIL) and sponsored by the Statistics and Operations Research Department. He’s also worked with teams in the NBA and NFL as well as the U.S. Olympic and Paralympic Committee.
